
MMC Executive Member's Profiles

Social Justice Strategic Focus

I attended a Hui on Social Justice Strategic Focus in Wellington on Friday the 24 November. This came up following an invitation to MMC from Reverend Dr Paul Reynolds, Social Justice Coordinator, 3-Tikanga Anglican. The MMC was invited as advisor in the area of Refugee portfolio group alongside key people from around the country.

The aim of this ongoing project is to bring together small groups with expertise and experience alongside an identified strategic social justice portfolio, to monitor developments and identify how, and when, the church should engage, and to identify key areas for short-term and long-term policy development and intervention, resulting in educational resourcing.



The current portfolios are:

- Refugees (support and services, refugee sponsorship, unaccompanied minors)
- Crime & Punishment (imprisonment, recidivism & reform, mental illness)
- Youth / Rangatahi (suicide, mental illness, addictions, homelessness)
- Women & Children (Violence, trauma, poverty, state care)
- Environment (Climate change, waterways, commodification of water)
- Employment (labour supply, migrant workers, living wage)
- Housing (homelessness, social housing, affordable housing)

After welcome by Bishop Ellie, Diocese of Wellington, and speech by Don Tamihere, we divide into portfolio groups and started a conversation around a worksheet provided as a guide around the Hui's outcomes.

The aim was for the group to come up with the best way to coordinate the work the Refugee portfolio group does and keep the momentum going, how the group like to communicate, share and meet as a group, what are the opportunity within our portfolio group for contributing to the development of government policy and what are the opportunities within the portfolio group for contributing to educational resource development, and raising awareness within the church and wider society.

The Refugee portfolio group was coordinated by Rev. Stephen King, Diocese of Wellington involved with refugee resettlement. Members included priests involved with families and support of refugees, law students from Victoria university passionate about helping people access to justice and human rights, a Victoria University researcher about social justice, former refugees involved with new refugee resettlement.

We had very good discussion and share of experiences around refugees' resettlement, and looked at how the church and the community can improve on the way we can help refugees feel welcomed, integrate and have a sense of belonging in the new community.

It was a very good opportunity for me to share what MMC does to help refugees resettle in the community and I look forward for further meetings to learn more from members of our group and hopefully improve on what the MMC does to help refugees integrate and feel included in our community.

Volunteer's profile

I was born in Japan, but lived in New York from age1-5 and in Hong Kong from age 12-15. I developed empathy for anyone struggling to settle in new countries, because I experienced the challenges associated with living in foreign countries myself early in life.

After completing a Ph.D. in Education specializing in multilingualism and language policy in immigrant communities, I returned to Japan to work for an international relief and development NGO. During my 12 year tenure, I planned and managed community development projects in 18 countries in Asia, Africa, and South America.

In 2016, my wife and I decided to move to New Zealand out of concerns for our sons' health after Fukushima nuclear disaster. Although I spent years studying about migrants' situations in the United States, I'd never expected that I would be a migrant myself raising children in a new country. So, I was totally at a loss when we arrived in Palmy, but I wanted to get involved in the services for new migrants and refugees locally.

At the very first newcomers coffee I joined, I learned that there are English language classes at MMC and that I could volunteer to teach as a tutor. So, I signed up as a volunteer and started to teach the following week. I still continue to teach as a volunteer tutor to this day.

Throughout my life, I lived and worked amongst people from many different countries, but I had never been a part of such a widely diverse group at MMC.

I feel privileged and thoroughly enjoyed having such a diverse groups of students and colleagues to work with, and I learned so much from them.

My family and I plan to move to Auckland next month. Although I already miss our friends and colleagues in Palmy immensely, I also look forward to opportunities to be involved in helping migrant communities in some way.

UCOL Flavour of Cultures Festival

The Pamanlahi Cultural Group performed for the first time at the Flavour of Cultures Festival held Thursday, November 2 at UCOL representing the Manawatu Multicultural Council. The Pamanlahi Cultural Group is a Filipino group which came into being late 2013. The objective of the group is to transfer and keep alive the historical and cultural traditions of the Philippines especially to the younger generation that were born and are now living overseas.

IDAW


The younger set of dancers from ages 5-15 first performed the dance called Ïdaw". The Idaw (from a word meaning bird) is a Bontoc (a province in the northern part of the Philippines) dance that portrays a war ceremony done by fighters from rival tribes. The dance is named after the bird which was believed to bring the omen of war. This dance depicts the hunting ritual performed before a tribal war. The tribes men would go out and search for the scared Idaw bird which they believe would lead the tribe to victory.

TINIKLING

Next on stage were the young ladies of the group who performed the Tinikling. Tinikling is a traditional Philippine folk dance which originated from Leyte, a province in the southern part of the Philippines. The dance involves two people beating, tapping, and sliding bamboo poles on the ground and against each other in coordination with one or more dancers who step over and in between the poles in a dance.

The name "tinikling" is a reference to birds locally known as the tikling. The dance imitates the movement of the tikling birds as they walk between grass stems, run over tree branches, or dodge bamboo traps set by

rice farmers. Dancers imitate the tikling bird's legendary grace and speed by skilfully maneuvering between large bamboo poles.



The emcee wondered how many instances the dancers' feet must have been caught in between the bamboo poles and the crowd must have been impressed because the group received a resounding applause even before the performance was completed.
