


NAVIGATION PROJECT

MMC Navigation Project is a year-long project, funded by Lottery COVID-19 Community Wellbeing Fund. We are very grateful to have an MMC Navigation Team comprised of leaders and active members from various MMC ethnic groups and community partners, Sergeant Qian Yang from Police, Sara Kian from Ministry of Education and Hina Cheema from City Library to help with the project.

The Language Assistance Service is filling the ethnic communities' translation needs. Our current available languages are: Burmese, Cantonese, Dari, Farsi, Hebrew, Hindi, Indonesian, Italian, Korean, Mandarin, Nepali, Portuguese, Rohingya, Russian, Samoan, Sinhalese, Spanish, Thai, Tongan, Urdu and Vietnamese.

COMMUNITY CONNECTORS

MMC and the Ministry of Social Development have partnered under the Government's COVID Response and Recovery Fund to provide the Community Connection which is focused on supporting community wellbeing and sustainability. Community Connectors support former refugees, migrants and newcomers to connect to housing, health, employment, volunteer, income and other social services. The Community Connectors use information and data gathered by individuals and communities via the Navigation Project to create pathway access to local services and support networks to connect the more vulnerable members of our community with information and support. MMC community connectors, Teisa Kurene and Indra Dulal, are dedicated to listen, understand and walk alongside our clients to provide the support and create connections that can help provide a safety net of social support services when they need help to navigate through life's challenges as individuals, families and communities. COMMUNITY CONNECTOR PROFILES

Teisa is a first-generation New Zealand born Samoan. As the child of migrants, she personally knows and feels passionate about finding a sense of belonging in NZ; recognising the challenges migrants and newcomers face in finding a way to both preserve and contribute from the importance of cultural identity in Manawatū. Teisa acknowledges that migrants often must work harder, with her own parents holding 2-3 jobs to make ends meet. She has worked her way up in the business world with experience at Fujitsu and IBM Australia. As a natural people person, she cares deeply for others whether that be a casual lunch with people in the community or helping MMC from all levels to show its best. Teisa is part of a member group and stepped down from board governance to take an active role in helping our communities directly. Her role as a connector aims to guide families as they navigate government and NGO assistance to overcome any challenges migrants, refugees and newcomers may face, particularly in employment, housing, and finances. Her wealth of knowledge and skills make MMC proud.

Indra Dulal is a warm and highly skilled community connector who MMC have the privilege to employ. Indra's story is inspiring, he continues to be tireless in his effort to give back to the community with MMC and at the local hospital. Naturally, Indra developed skills as a multi-linguist when his world changed forever during the political unrest of a government bent on the abhorrent idea of ethnic cleansing. He was forced to leave his hometown Salami in the Chirang province of Bhutan, with nothing except that which he could carry on his back. Indra along with over 100,000 refugees between 1990-1993 made a 2-day journey on foot and through forest fleeing Bhutan to India, then catching a bus to eastern Nepal. Indra spent much of his young adulthood in a refugee camp which didn't stop him from shining and helping others. He spent 12 years teaching in the camp without electricity, using manual equipment and ink provided by CARITAS an organisation which he still donates to today. In 2009, many forms and efforts later, Indra finally arrived in New Zealand. With the help of resettlement organisations, his own hard work and determination Indra began to build a new life. Working in NZ as an interpreter, volunteering at the PNCC library, providing language assistance at schools in Palmerston North right up to the great achievement of being made a Justice of the Peace all so he can continue to help others, and role model to his cultural community. Indra credits his wife with his success as she is the ground from which he is able to bear fruit for others.

AFGHAN NAVIGATOR

Asmatullah holds a master's degree in commerce along with experience in the fields of banking, business and social activities. He is a goal-oriented person, focused on completing specific tasks to achieve a planned outcome.

As an Afghan navigator he aims to educate Afghan families to analyse their strengths and opportunities, set personal and vocational goals to build their self-esteem, confidence and motivation to support their community.



ONE TOGETHER RESEARCH

MMC have undertaken research for the Navigation Team Project with Justin Ngai as the research lead. In the One Together Research Report a series of interviews were conducted to better understand the needs of migrants and newcomers to Manawatū who reside in NZ without their families.

The results of the research found that the level of satisfaction and wellbeing among participants was not significantly different in NZ as it was in their home countries. This does not mean that newcomers do not struggle adjusting to life in NZ, though the participants had very different experiences with immigrating all of them had experienced struggles settling in. The main areas for improvement in support being finances, employment, boredom, isolation, homesickness and language. Recommendations from the report encouraged organisations to provide access to employment and financial services, host more activities, create social events and projects and further promote services for Migrants/Newcomers.

With the research being largely successful in pinpointing the areas of focus where organisations can provide support to newcomers, we hope to see the level of services and wellbeing improve among our newcomers and migrant communities.

POLICE STRATEGIC PLAN

On the 16th of March Sergeant Q along with the National Police Ethnic department held a zoom session to meet and discuss a refresh to their Ethnic Strategy with community leaders. Sergeant Q on behalf of the Police would like to acknowledge and send thanks to all of those who participated in the event.

As a result of the session, the 2022 Police Ethnic Strategy draft has been created and shared with community leaders. The draft will be refined further after consultation with community leaders nationwide. Police are aiming to have a full and confirmed version of the strategy available by July 2022. The final version will be shared with community leaders and service providers in the region.

MMC would like to thank Sergeant Q and the Police for their continued dedication and efforts to connect with ethnic communities. It is important that we all feel heard and safe in our communities.

GLOBAL PARENTS SUPPORT INTERNATIONAL YOUTH VOLUNTEER TRAINING

In December 2021, Angel Kwan from Global Parents Support with youth leaders Krista McJarrow-Keller and Frank Wong, successfully hosted two sessions of International Youth Volunteer Training for 20 young people.

The youth group are full of passion and kindness, working for people in the community during their summer break. In the community garden they worked all morning cleaning out the weeds, harvesting vegetables and tidying compost. They mentored at Junior Leadership Training to share their cultures and languages. There is more volunteer work to be done and hopefully we will be back on track when the Covid-19 situation gets better.

Our event name 'Around the World' came from our 'Airport' theme! This came to our mind since an airport is where all the cultures mix as various people walk in and out of the big building, ready to set off to some place new. Upon entry, people were given a passport which they then took with them to different activity stalls and would get a stamp once the activity was completed. Activities included Henna, Guess the Language quiz, Guess the flags quiz, Pin on the Map, Put up the Bindi, Origami, Calligraphy, Ludo and 123 Dragon.
